Blacklock is no shrinking violet, standing at 6-feet, 7 inches, and billing herself as the World's Tallest Female Comic. Guinness Book of World Records has classified Kim as the 7th tallest woman in the world.

Blacklock attributed her height to her multi-ethnic heritage consisting of French, Irish and Samoan. She jokes: "Having a father who was 6 feet, 6 inches tall and played defensive tackle for the San Francisco 49'ers didn't hurt either."

Blacklock recalled during her childhood her mother brought her to a local playground. "Some of the other children's parents came over to my mom since they were upset over my behavior. They queried: 'Why can't Kim play as nicely as the other six year olds?' My mom replied: 'Because she is only two!'"

In 1991, Kim joined the Screen Actors Guild when residing in New Mexico and was featured in Robert Ward's movie, "Brother-hood and the Gun" before moving onto playing a female trucker in "Revenge of the Highway."

Kim next decided to take a break from motion pictures to care for a family of Native American siblings aged 6, 8 and 9 and their quadriplegic aunt. She did a fantastic job since the elementary age kids are now adults with families and children of their own.

Kim has a 22-year-old biological son who is a Carmel High School graduate and senior at RPI who has been living and working in Germany since the end of last July.

Blacklock is also one of America's funniest comedians: "I make my height and multi-ethnic identity a central part of my comedic persona."

She compares her stage presence to Sarah Silverman and Margaret Cho and has performed on the grand stage at comedy clubs throughout the U.S. including the famed Caroline's on Broadway.

Blacklock believes that "creativity can be applied to enhance the outcomes of any job. When you live and work in the creative fields themselves, the sky is the limit."

Blacklock said the mission of her Fairfield Arts was to "promote arts, culture, environmental stewardship and economic development. We help create spaces and places where anyone can pursue his or her


